New events for 2017 include a Dinner Dance on the evening of Saturday 25th February and a Murder Mystery Supper on Monday 27th February. This year our Festival stretches over a couple of weeks. The first event will be our annual Snowdrop Lecture on Thursday 23rd February, the Pride of Place Snowdrop Ceilidh will be on Friday 3rd March with the Snowdrop Cycle two days after. Pride of Place will be running a Snowdrop Tea Shop in the Y Hall in Union Street. Our High Street Store has prepared inspiring arts and craft workshops. **Places are limited, so please book your space early!** Finally we have our annual Snowdrop Bingo Tea run by the local Primary School and their friends. No doubt the event will be a sell out, as usual.

All through the Festival there will be opportunities to undertake Snowdrop Walks around the town and admire the window display competition.

The Coupar Angus Snowdrop event is part of the national Scottish Snowdrop Festival which features snowdrop displays in over 50 places around Scotland. Most of the displays are linked to country houses. As yet the Coupar Angus Festival remains the only community event. The Festival is loosely coordinated by the Town Team but really it is about local groups sharing their skills, excitement, enterprise and enthusiasm for snow drops and for Coupar Angus. Please come and enjoy our Festival and, if you are a visitor, take the chance to look around our award winning town: we won the 'Britain in Bloom Best Large Village Award' in both 2013 and 2015!

The second speaker is Katie Dessain from Lawton House near Arbroath. Lawton features a woodland garden of beech trees carpeted with snowdrops and crocuses in spring, set around a 1755 Georgian house. There is also a walled garden planted with fruit trees and vegetables. The property was owned for many years by Elizabeth and Patrick Allan Fraser who built Hospitalfield House in Arbroath and famous visitors include Winston Churchill who courted his future wife, Clementine in the grounds.

## **COUPAR BURN PROJECT Sat 25 and Sun 26 February 11.00 - 15.00**

In May of last year local artist Frances Law was joined by members of Coupar Angus community and the committee of stART (Strathmore Arts Festival) in an 'archaeological investigation' into the Coupar Burn. An interesting collection of objects were found: Victorian spoons, clay pipes, an assortment of old bottles and jars, childrens toys, mobile phones, crockery and much more. Frances displayed the collection of objects at Dundee University, the 'Coupar Burn Project' forming the basis of her research for her Masters in Art, Society and Publics at Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art and Design. The project has caught the attention of the education officer and curators at Perth Museum and Art Gallery who have invited Frances to show her display alongside treasures which have been found in the River Tay. This exhibition will take place between June and September 2017.

Frances is hoping to make a short film about Coupar Burn and is collecting stories and memories from local people about the Burn. If you would like to see what has been found in the Burn and have a story to share about playing in the Burn or items you may have lost or found in the Burn or indeed any memory or information related to the Burn, you would be most welcome to visit Frances upstairs at the Y Hall. Come along and see the displays she has been working on for the Perth Museum.

**SNOWDROP WALK 1: Snowdrops spelling 'Coupar Angus'**

A circular walk starting and finishing at the Y Hall on Union Street. It takes about 1.5 hours and is approximately 3 km long, includes a short hill and has several view points. From the Y Hall head towards the main car park entrance to the Red House Hotel. The **letter C** is in the grass verge, beside the main road, just to the south. From there walk south, to the roundabout at the Balhousie Care Home turnoff. Do not turn into the road to Balhousie Care Home but walk onto the waste land just beyond it and head towards the stone wall. The right hand end of the wall joins onto a new, high, wire fence and a track that leads down the side of the fence, south towards the burn. Take this track. After about 20 m a T-junction will appear in the track, where there is a tall telegraph post. The **letter O** is just on the left, immediately before the left fork, circling a small upright stone. From here, take the left fork and walk along the new track on the south side of the high wire fence. Follow this path towards Larghan Park. *If this track is flooded, walk to Larghan Park by turning around and following the proper footpaths past the Red House, turning right at the Red House roundabout and walking along the pavement towards Forfar until you reach Larghan Park.*

Enter Larghan Park by the large car park entrance at the east end of the park i.e. away from the swings and play area. Pick up the track round the park and turn right. After about 100 m you will see the “love seat” and the famous Snowdrop Heart. Find the **letter U** nearby. Walk right round the park and leave at the town end. Head towards The Common on Forfar Road, opposite East of Scotland Farmers. Walk up the right hand side of Townhead with The Common on your left. At the top right hand corner of The Common find the **letter P**. Walk along School Road, past the school and at the far end, at the house with the monkey puzzle trees in the garden, cross the main Blairgowrie Road and turn right. Walk up the footpath and as you approach the flower meadow and old trailer on the left of Blair Bend, look out for the **letter A** on the bank. Continue on the footpath and when you get to where the lane runs up on the left to Beech Hill ( about 150 m) look out for the **letter R** in the grass. Walk down the hill past the berry fields and Boatlands Farm (on the right) until you reach the grassy verge at the bottom of Butterybank Road. On this verge look for the **letter A**. Walk up Butterybank Road to enter the new Community Woodland, look at the newly planted trees and enjoy the view. On the sloping grassy bank to the town side of the seat you will find the **letter N**.

Head up Butterybank Road to the junction with Caddam Road and turn right up Caddam Road. Walk up the left side of Caddam Road and go into the garden of Drumlogie to see the fabulous display of snowdrops there. Continue up Caddam Road and note the rows of snowdrops planted for quite a distance on both sides. Look for the **letter G** on the sloping grassy bank opposite the track on the right that leads to Kemphill Farm, the river and the Community Garden. If you like, walk 30 m down the track and take a peek at the Community Garden, set up in July 2014. For more great views of the Grampians and Sidlaws walk a little further up Caddam Road or about 200 m down the Kemphill Track. Retrace your steps down Caddam Road and turn right into Strathmore Avenue. Stay on the right hand side and at the junction with Sidlaw Place look for the **letter U** on one grass verge as well as a snowdrop spiral design on the opposite grass verge. Keep walking down Strathmore Avenue, turn left and keeping on the right side walk up Kings Road until you see a wee path to the right that will take you onto George Street, the main road to Perth.

Turn right and walk past Scotmid and 2 Sisters factory until you are just past the grassy mound with the large standing stone. The final **letter S** is in the grass verge on a mound a bit towards Perth from the standing stone. While you are on the verge, look across the road to the Coupar Burn that flows there. The banks of this part of the burn are covered in a lovely display of snowdrops. Walk back up to the main street past the new Community Garden at Rodgers Buildings to the Y Hall for refreshments.

## **SNOWDROP WALK 2: Coupar Angus to Lintrose and back**

A circular walk starting and finishing at the Y Hall on Union Street. It will take about 2.5 hours to walk or 50 minutes to cycle and is approximately 7 km long. The walk is mainly flat and there are opportunities for some fabulous views.

Leave the Y Hall and make your way to the traffic lights on the relief road, opposite the White House. Set off up the road to Dundee, admiring Roz Arno-Button’s large snowdrop mural on the window of the house next to the Steeple tower.

Turn right into Precinct Street, walk on past the Enverdale Gym and continue for another kilometre or so. Note the fabulous display of snowdrops on each side of the road: they were planted by the late Fred French of Campmuir for his wife and run from Coupar Angus to his former house at Campmuir. The road goes up a gentle hill and then comes to minor crossroads with a bend to the right, another wee road straight on and a track to the left. On the left there is a sign for East Balgersho, the location of Roz Arno-Button’s Potting Shed

Studio. During the Snowdrop Festival you are welcome to drop in and take a look at the exhibition there.

Turn back and follow the road straight on which will take you past Balgersho House and Cottages. After about 1.5 km you will approach Campmuir. Fred French's house is tucked in the trees on the left. Continue to the T-junction and turn left. Continue past the road off to the right, until you reach a cottage on the left and a sign indicating a footpath through the grounds of Lintrose House. Take this footpath and follow it down through the woods to the wee loch, hydro scheme and old mill. As you walk down the hill past the mill you will see the den on the left is carpeted with snowdrops and some yellow aconites. Mrs Riddell-Webster of Lintrose is happy that you enjoy the snowdrops and spend some time admiring them in their natural setting. From this point follow the obvious track past the farm buildings and Gardeners Cottage and when you reach the end of the track turn right onto the road and then first left. Keep on towards Kettins Crossroads, turn left and walk towards Coupar Angus. You will notice the more than 9000 snowdrops planted along the verge over the last two years. Make your way back to the Y Hall for refreshments.
